

Recipients of the 2006 Winston Churchill Memorial Trust Fellowships

Churchill Fellowships are intended for travel, typically short term of between three weeks and three months duration, for intensive investigative research.

The Trust helps all kinds of New Zealanders – including community workers, engineers, business people, actors, teachers, nuns, artists – to travel overseas and bring back with them new insights and understanding that will enrich their community and, ultimately, New Zealand as a whole.



Mr Reg HARRIS: travelled to the United Kingdom to visit manufacturing centres of excellence. The research will inform the manufacturing sector within New Zealand.

Mr Tim ARMSTRONG: travelled to the United Kingdom, Canada and the United States of America to research new technology and innovations relating to the supply of energy to domestic homes generated from renewable resources.

Ms Jane DRUMM: travelled to the United Kingdom to visit programmes that are working in innovative ways to assist families who are victims of domestic violence. In particular assisting mothers and their children to develop strategies to remove themselves from violent situations.

Mr Robin COX: travelled to Canada, the United States of America and Australia to study and network with internationally credible youth mentoring programmes to inform and expand youth mentoring in New Zealand.

Mrs Charitee GAY: travelled to the United States of America to study the Art Realisation Technique as a means for self expression, developing this programme for use in New Zealand.

Ms Jackie CRAWFORD: travelled to the United Kingdom to research the provision of cardiac inherited disease services, including biological sample storage, storage and safety of genetic information, grief and psychosocial issues.

Ms Gerardine CLIFFORD: travelled to the United Kingdom to research family violence programmes for third and fourth generation migrant populations in urban low socio-economic communities.

Ms Moya McCONNELL: travelled to Scotland to investigate restorative justice practice, with particular attention to shuttle mediation, post sentence and facilitator training.

Ms Denise HENIGAN: travelled to Australia, Holland and the United Kingdom to learn how cities develop infrastructure to improve the balance to favour pedestrians and cyclists, to create a safer more attractive and sustainable local environment.
